Women's History Month



March marks the celebration of Women's History Month, which originated in 1978, when the Education Task Force of Sonoma Commission on the Status of Women planned a week dedicated to women in Santa Rosa, California. This was called "Women's History Week" and was celebrated during the week of March 8 to correspond with International Women's Day. A teacher in Santa Rosa named Molly Murphy McGregor led the weeklong celebration which highlighted women's contributions to American history, culture, and society. She did this by making presentations at dozens of schools throughout Sonoma County, California. The task force also hosted a parade in downtown Santa Rosa, and hundreds of students participated in an essay contest honoring local women.

This event was not originally intended to become an annual celebration, but communities across the country organized their own women's history celebration the following year. President Jimmy Carter brought the celebration to the whole country when he issued the first Presidential Proclamation, declaring the week of March 2-8, 1980, as National Women's History Week.

Congress and the President have annually issued resolutions and proclamations declaring March as Women's History Month since 1988. According to the National Women's History Alliance (NWHA), "These proclamations celebrate the contributions women have made to the United States and recognize the specific achievements women have made over the course of American history in a variety of fields."

The theme for Women's History Month this 2023 year is "Celebrating Women who Tell Our Stories." The NWHA is encouraging recognition of women,



past and present, who have been active in all forms of media and storytelling. Women in every community who have devoted their lives and talents to producing art, pursuing truth, and reflection the human condition, is what this theme honors. This year, the NWHA will popularize national efforts though live celebrations from women who told and continue to tell stories from the female perspective.
